

Raising young children in the city can be difficult, particularly for a single parent with limited financial resources. More than finding affordable, decent housing, a single parent needs a secure place where neighbors can be relied on to help out when needed, more of a family than a neighborhood.

Valerie Martinez is a thirdgeneration Little Earth community member. In addition to having a safe, affordable home at Little Earth, Valerie and her three children - Ayanna (7), Nycia (4) and Sequoy (3) - were able to take advantage of the education and parenting classes offered by the community. Nycia Martinez was the first child registered at the LE NELC and all three have been regular participants in the community's early learning programs.

As a single parent, giving her kids the freedom to play with their friends while making sure that they are safe was a great relief to Valerie. The family-oriented structure of the community allowed Valerie to do just that.

"The thing I liked most about living at Little Earth is that it is a community of families. I didn't have to worry about my kids when they were outside playing - we all look out for one another."

Although Valerie and her children recently moved into a new apartment outside Little Earth, they stay involved in the community. Her children still attend the LE NELC on a regular basis.
